<p>The programme serves as a global platform to support the provision of quality information on goods and services and the identification and implementation of the most effective strategies to engage consumers in sustainable consumption. It empowers and raises the profile of relevant policies, strategies, projects and partnerships, building synergies and cooperation between different stakeholders to leverage resources towards mutual goals.</p>

<p>1) Improve availability, accesibility and quality of consumer information; 2) drive change in business and government; and 3) enhance communication to drive behavioural change.</p>	
Key accomplishments at 10YFP mid-term	
<p>At the launch of the programme, the lack of international guidance and agreement around consumer information was identified as the key challenge to be addressed. Accordingly, the key priority over the first years was to address this, and a truly multi-stakeholder and collaborative achievement of the CI-SCP was the launch of the Guidelines for Providing Product Sustainability Information in 2017, the culmination of over two years' drafting and stakeholder consultation, with over 140 institutions contributing. The Guidelines were cited in a resolution at UNEA-3 in December 2017, and their road testing with companies and standard-setting organizations began.</p> <p>4 working groups have allowed progress and stakeholder collaboration on priority issues under the CI-SCP, in addition to the Guidelines these cover social impact communication, eco-labelling, and sustainable public procurement and labels/ sustainability standards (jointly with the SPP programme). The CI-SCP has further focused on the issue of product lifetime extension and circular economy, and the role of consumers in this agenda.</p> <p>The programme's portfolio at mid-term also includes consumer surveys to inform country level activities, national governments' action plans, policies and strategies, eco-labelling initiatives, communications campaigns and training workshops, as well as business and industry commitments, all ultimately working towards making sustainability the easier choice for consumers.</p>

The programme facilitates the sharing of good practices, launch implementation projects, creates cooperation networks, and commits actors around the world to sustainable construction.</p>

<p>During its first phase (2015-2016) the programme focused on establishing its administrative framework and communication infrastructure, initiating its Trust Fund projects, preparing project proposals to donors, and attending major relevant events within buildings and construction to raise awareness and collect stakeholder feedback.</p> <p>Currently in its second phase (2017-2018), the programme has focused on the re-organisation of its MAC, the implementation of its Trust Fund projects, the attendance and the promotion of the programme at major events, and the engagement of its partners within the focus area of circular economy. In addition, the programme has chaired both the monitoring and evaluation task force and the strategy task force of the One Planet network.</p>

<p>The programme promotes a systems-based approach, which incorporates considerations to address global challenges through interventions addressing production as well as, and through to, consumption. The holistic perspective that the programme promotes, and the fact that its main objectives relate to awareness raising, capacity building and technical assistance, fostering enabling environments, and ensuring collaboration and partnerships across its network, positions the programme to contribute to the mainstreaming of SCP within food systems.</p>

Key accomplishments at 10YFP mid-term	
<p>The programme has seen substantial progress since its launch, with regards to building the necessary structures to make the programme operational, including: approving and kicking off eight “core initiatives”, the principal projects of the programme, expanding the portfolio of activities; ensuring progress of such projects; and bridging collaboration and multi-stakeholder dialogue both among its partners. Between 2016 and 2017 the programme succeeded in securing 22 additional “affiliated projects” of which all are presented online as part of the programme portfolio.</p> <p>The programme organized its 1st Global Conference hosted by DTI South Africa (co-lead), and organized by a committee formed by Switzerland, South Africa, Costa Rica, USDA, Hivos, WWF, UN Environment, and FAO, with financial support of Nestlé, and with contributions by various programme actors and external organizations. More than 130 organizations participated in the conference, which included a series of learning journeys in the conference program as well as a “Taste of Waste” dinner event with rescued food served by famed chefs. During the conference, portfolio projects and activities of the programme were presented; external organizations (global, regional and national) also showcased their relevant activities or opportunities (UN-GEF, IFAD, IPES-Food, ADB, etc.), and the selected Trust Fund projects were presented. A remarkable achievement was the resolution (the Pretoria Resolution) issued at the end of the conference and signed by its organizing committee, which expressed the conference’s conclusions and call for action</p> <p>The programme has been active in the pooling of its partners’ resources, including through its core initiatives, contributions to external fora and events, as well as by promoting the establishment of an FAO-UNEP interagency umbrella programme in support of the programme.</p>

Through the development and implementation of activities, projects and good practices in resource efficient and low-carbon tourism, the programme steers the tourism sector towards enhanced sustainability by reducing the loss of biodiversity, preserving ecosystems and cultural heritage, while advancing poverty alleviation and sustainable livelihood.</p>

<p>Since its launch, the programme has grown continuously in membership and currently involves 150 partners¹ committed to accelerate SCP in the tourism sector. Additionally, through the tourism networks that are actively engaged, the programme reaches an additional 400 organizations. The programme offers its full membership the opportunity to meet in person once a year, through the organization the International Symposium and Annual Conference.</p> <p>During its three years of operation the programme has progressively translated its thematic priorities, as defined in the its concept note, into streamlined core activities to generate added value for its partners, as follows: a) Advocacy materials that raise the visibility of the efforts of network members such as the Annual Magazine or the Calendar of Events; b) Knowledge sharing opportunities through the participation of members in public fora and the organization of webinars on topics such as climate change, SMEs or tourism planning; c) Technical support for the organization of events and the implementation of projects; and d) Piloting, since 2015, the Portfolio of Work as a tool for network partners to be able to aggregate their efforts towards a shared goal and includes activities such as the Conference on Sustainable Tourism in SIDS held in the Seychelles (SSTF); trainings on sustainable practices by GSTC and PATA involving Asian countries and businesses; publications such as the Handbook “Destination: a circular tourism economy” for South Baltic countries (CRT); and</p>
